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








St. Josaphat (November 12)



The Lord said: I am the gate; whoever enters through me will be saved. They will come in and go out, and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full. "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep. So when he sees the wolf coming, he abandons the sheep and runs away. Then the wolf attacks the flock and scatters it. The man runs away because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep. "I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me—just as the Father knows me and I know the Father—and I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that are not of this sheep pen. I must bring them also. They too will listen to my voice, and there shall be one flock and one shepherd. (Jn. 10, 9-16)

John Kuntsevych was born in Volodymyr Volynsk, in 1580. As a young boy, he loved to frequent the holy services and prayed with great fervor. In 1604, He entered the decadent Monastery of the Holy Trinity in Vilnius, Lithuania. Upon receiving the monastic tonsure and habit, he took the name Josaphat. By his example of fidelity and self-denial, he was able to reform the monastery, together with his friend Joseph Rutsky.

Their loving example spread beyond the monastery walls to the entire Ukrainian Church. In 1617, Rutsky and Josaphat succeeded in forming a confederation of monasteries, which became the Order of St. Basil the Great. To his great dismay, in 1618, Josaphat was appointed Archbishop of Polotsk-Vitebsk. For five years, he worked diligently to achieve church unity, as the Saviour had prayed "so that all may be one." Josaphat's humility and zeal won over many people, but also angered those who did not want to be united with Rome. Thus, during a pastoral visitation of his cathedral in Vitebsk, on November 12, 1623, Josaphat was brutally martyred; his body stripped and thrown in the river.

Immediately after his death, many miracles of conversion were attributed to his intercession, beginning with the conversion of his murderers. One of the greatest opponents of union with Rome, Bishop Meleti Smotrytsky, attributed his own conversion to Josaphat.

Josaphat Kuntsevych was beatified by Pope Urban VIII on May 16,1643 and canonized by Blessed Pope Pius IX, on June 29, 1867. He is the first Ukrainian Saint to be formally beatified an canonized. To celebrate the three-hundredth anniversary of the Saint's martyrdom, Pope Pius XI issued an encyclical letter, Ecclesiam Dei. Since 1963, his incorrupt body lies under the altar of Saint Basil, in the Vatican Basilica of St. Peter's.

NOTICE FOR ST. MARY'S UKRAINIAN CATHOLIC CEMETERY, FOX CHASE, PA

Excessive complaints as to the care and appearance of our St. Mary's Ukrainian Catholic Cemetery in Fox Chase, PA have led me to personally intervene. Regulation of a custom some people have come to practice has become problematic for the appearance and maintenance of our cemetery. Some people have installed copings in front of monuments, placed candles and planted flowers in front of the monuments. Some plants are now major size bushes uprooting monuments. While some people provide care for these areas, more than two thirds are completely neglected. People have unjustifiably come

to expect our cemetery staff to clean and maintain these areas, adding considerably to maintenance costs. Numerous complaints are received as to the appearance of the cemetery because of the unsightly appearance of the neglected areas. More important, the copings installed by people without permission exposes these people and the cemetery to great risk for liability claims. These people and the cemetery could be sued if someone would be inadvertently hurt by these copings. Further, the cemetery lacks the beauty it ought to have. Such copings are not allowed at other cemeteries.



Therefore, in order to create safe and uniform conditions, all such copings, all plantings of any kind (including flowers) and all lamps or similar objects placed in front, behind or on the sides of monuments must be removed no later than February 1st, 2014. Lamps, vases, etc. may only be placed on the base of a monument—but they cannot be left on the ground. After February 1st, 2014, our cemetery staff is instructed to remove any items which continue to remain in the ground and obstruct the areas around the monuments. These items will be discarded. The areas will be filled in with earth and grass planted by staff. St. Mary's Cemetery will then reflect the beauty and order we all expect in our cemetery.

There will be no exceptions to this policy. Your complete compliance with this policy will be greatly appreciated. Thank you for your anticipated understanding and acceptance.

Priests of the Washington Deanery Gather for Vision 2020 Workshop

WASHINGTON - The priests of the Washington Deanery gathered on October 16, 2013, at St. Josaphat Seminary for the latest Vision 2020 workshop to begin developing a pastoral plan for each of their parishes. Fr. Stepan Bilyk, the Archieparchial Coordinator of Vision 2020 and Director for Religious Education enthusiastically conducted the workshop. The Vision 2020 program is the plan for renewed evangelization and pastoral action initiated by Patriarch Sviatoslav with his pastoral letter: "The Vibrant Parish - a Place to Encounter the living Christ" (2 December 2011). Metropolitan Stefan Soroka has dedicated several recent cleray conferences of the Archeparchy to the Vision 2020 program and was one of the members on the team of bishops working on a plan for renewed evangelization efforts in our Ukrainian Catholic Church around the world and within the Archeparchy of Philadelphia.

This workshop focused upon the tasks and skills that will be used by the pastors when they conduct a series of four meetings with the faithful of their parishes to develop a pastoral plan for 2014.

The Washington Deanery is comprised of parishes in two states and the District of Columbia. For Washington, DC, there are the Ukrainian Catholic National Shrine of the Holy Family and St. Josaphat Seminary served by Fr. Robert Hitchens and Fr. Wasyl

Sisters Servants of Mary Immaculate – "Profess for Life" Sister Kathleen Hutsko, SSMI

January 2012, shared with you that part of our New Year's resolution was to include a Sister Servants "Called by Name" vocation story in each edition of THE WAY. Unfortunately, I did not submit all of them. However, they are available on our website www.ssmi-us.ora. at The purpose of these articles was to follow the example of the disciples in "saturating Jerusalem with the message of Jesus Christ." The stories were to show that sisters are real people with strengths and weaknesses, who try to respond to God's call as Women Religious. The intention was to confirm that a commitment to Jesus as a religious is still very relevant, a blessing, and verv much a needed vocation in our The affirming society. letters and comments from our readers were humbling, encouraging and hopefully a sign that parents, grandparents, friends and family will encourage women and men to enter religious life and the priesthood.

As Provincial Superior, I will share my vocation story in "wrapping up" this segment. I was born in Whiting (Hammond) Indiana to Mary and Basil Hutsko, the youngest of four children. My childhood upbringing centered on Church and family with a solid family unit – never experiencing a baby-sitter.

My parents' lives demonstrated to their children the importance of respect, hard work and service to others. The Church was just a natural part of the fiber of our lives. All of us attended Mary's Byzantine St. Catholic School, weekly Sunday Divine Lituray, evening services, the annual pilgrimages to Uniontown, PA, and helping at all church and school functions. still remember importance of confession as part of our family traditions. Each time we went to confession, we had to ask each member of our family to forgive us for any hurt we had caused them. This was not always easy, but it did give me a strong foundation of compassion and I learned not to hold grudges.

I grew up at a time when the culture supported one's faith and it was a blessing for parents to have a child become a priest or enter religious life. My parents set a good religious foundation, and when my twin brothers entered the seminary to study for the priesthood, it just seemed natural.

My journey was a little delayed. I was familiar with the Sisters of St. Basil in Uniontown, PA as they were the ones who taught at our parochial school and I went every year to the Our Lady of Perpetual Help pilgrimage. Although I admired the Sisters and liked being around them, I didn't feel any pressure to follow in my brothers' footsteps. I worked in Chicago for a few years, but could not resist the feeling that I was being called to do something else with my life.

I entered the Order of the Sisters of St. Basil in Uniontown, PA when I was 20 years old. Unfortunately, after 10 months, due to my own struggles and fears, I returned home and went back to work in Chicago. Two years later, I began to contemplate the call of religious life again. However, this time it would be a risk as "people" and even my

family would see it as an embarrassment if I failed again.

The internal struggles and growth that I experienced while I was a candidate with the Sisters of St. Basil enabled me to have the courage to be open to God's call, and not be afraid to take a second chance at religious life. I will always be grateful to the sisters for their role in my journey.

Eventually, at the age of 24, through the promptings of the late Rev. Joseph Bodnar, I entered the Congregation of the Sisters Servants of Mary Immaculate in Sloatsburg, NY. Although I was not Ukrainian, I was warmly accepted and

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felt at home with living out the Gospel values in the charism of the Sisters Servants.

I graduated from Seton Hall University and most of my religious life has been in education as a teacher and principal. The hundreds of students and parishioners, who have entered and touched my life, are a treasure which I will always cherish. I was elected Provincial Superior in 2011 for a five-year term. This ministry is a gift and a challenge for which I pray the grace to fulfill according to God's plan.

It has not always been easy, but it has been

life-giving. It has been a joy to share the charism of Blessed Josaphata with women who are committed not only with their hearts but with their whole beings. Today, the Sisters Servants are still vital players in creating a vibrant church. Our work is not done and as they say, the best is vet to come. It is with

a sincere heart that I zealously invite other women to pray for the courage to discern if God is calling you to be a Sister Servant of Mary Immaculate.

Sisters of St. Basil the Great Continue "Christ Our Pascha" Series

The second in a continuing series on the Catechism of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, "Christ Our Pascha", sponsored by the Sisters of the Order of St. Basil the Great, was held Saturday, October 19, 2013, at the Basilian Spirituality Center, Fox Chase Manor, PA.

The presenter for the conference was Dr. Robert Marko, Professor and Chair of Theology Aquinas College, Grand Rapids, MI, who holds a Doctoral Degree in Moral Theology from Duquesne University. A visiting professor in Eastern Christian Ethics at the Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky Institute of St. Paul University in Canada and a Fulbright Scholar in Social Ethics at the Ukrainian Catholic

University in Lviv, Ukraine, Dr. Marko is a passionate advocate for a deeper appreciation of the Eastern Catholic Churches.

Reviewing the fact that the Catechism consists of three sections—The Faith of the Church; The Prayer of the Church; The Life of the Church--, the workshop centered on the third part-the spiritual and moral dimensions of the Church, with Dr. Marko speaking on the topic, "Partakers of the Divine Nature: Life in Christ and the Church".

The morning session focused on how the theological emphases in the East complement the Western understanding of moral growth and transformation, ancestral

sin and the eight passions or sins as found in Evagrius of Pontus.

The afternoon session considered how certain social issues such as the relationship of Church and State, the meaning of democracy, Christian citizenship, and the reality of social sin receive a distinct emphasis when considered in a particular cultural and historical context.

Lively discussions took place throughout the workshop and at its conclusion the participants described the experience as "enlightening", "illuminating", "educational as well as humorous".

Sr. Ann Laszok, OSBM, coordinator of the

event, thanked all for their participation in a workshop she found personally enriching, while Sr. Dorothy Ann OSBM. Busowski, Provincial Superior of the Sisters of St. Basil, thanked Dr. Marko for his willingness to take part in the series as a presenter and for making "a complicated subject understandable to all." Sr. Dorothy Ann also thanked those who attended from near and far, Sr. Ann for publicizing the series and Sr. Marina Bochnewich, OSBM, the Director of the Basilian Spirituality Center.






Mass of Installation of Bishop Elias Zaidan, Maronite **Eparchy Our Lady of Lebanon, St. Louis, Missouri**

Heads of Ukrainian Churches appeal to the Ukrainian people on the occasion of the 80th anniversary of Holodomor

Wednesday, 23 October 2013

Heads of traditional Ukrainian Churches appealed to the faithful and all people of good will to join in the All-Ukrainian community initiative: A National Day of Memory on the 80th anniversary of the Holodomor.

This appeal is in solidarity with the initiative of the Community Committee to Commemorate the Victims of the Holodomor-Genocide of 1932-33 in Ukraine . The Committee includes prominent community and art activists, scholars, and representatives



of Ukrainian Churches. "We ask you to express your own good will and join together with others from your place of worship in this All-Ukrainian joint effort," states the Appeal.

People are being urged to organize in their church communities work on putting into order the mass graves of those who perished during the years of the Holodomor and are frequently located on village lands of Ukraine. One can place a wooden cross with an embroidered cloth and organize remembrance services in their churches on the 80th anniversary of Holodomor (November 23, 2013).

Heads of Ukrainian Churches appeal to the faithful and people of good will to join in organizing an All-National Day of Remembrance in Kyiv: "To delegate representatives from the church community to pay respects to the memory of perished family members and co-patriots, by joining the remembrance efforts on November 23rd between 2 and 5 pm. by the National Museum – A Memorial to the memory of victims of Holodomors in Ukraine in its capital, says the document.

"A unification of society around spiritual ideals, community self-organization and mutual support – these are a good haven under conditions of political and economical crises," argue the writers of the appeal. Particularly, the Church Primates address their appeal to those who evoke trust and respect from people, possesses wisdom and life experience.

Let us remember that this year Ukraine and the world will commemorate the 80th anniversary of the memory of the victims of the Holodmor - Genocide of 1932-33. This tragic page remains an unhealed wound in the history of our people. The memory of millions of lost lives, the pain of hundreds of thousands of families, unites most of the citizens of Ukraine, who always on the fourth Saturday of November light a candle of remembrance and go to the memorial places in Kyiv and in their cities and villages. This memory actively contributes to social peace and understanding among people, united by a shared pain about the past and a hope for the future.

The Appeal by the Heads of the Churches was delivered at a press conference in Kyiv by the representatives of the Community Committee to Commemorate the Holodmor-Genocide of 1932-33 in Ukraine: Rev. Oleksa Petriv, head of the UGCC Department of Public Affairs, Bishop Yevstratiy Zoria, Secretary of the Synod of UOC-KP, and Yevhen Sverstiuk, the nation's conscience.

UGCC Head: 'If We Do Not Foster the Institution of Family, We Will Always Have Social Orphans'

From the perspective of a Christian, the family is an institution established by the Creator as a indissoluble and fruitful unity of a man and a woman. Only such a family can provide proper upbringing to children, Patriarch Sviatoslav Shevchuk of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church (UGCC) said on October 24 in Kyiv during a roundtable discussion on child abandonment.

A public discussion on this subject was held at the Committee of the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine.



According to the Information Department of the UGCC, Yuriy Pavlenko, the Presidential Commissioner for Children's Rights, deputies, and representatives of NGOs and charitable foundations participated in the roundtable.

In his address, Patriarch Sviatoslav informed the participants that the church has experience working with immigrants and their families, both in Ukraine and in parishes abroad. He said that in the eparchies there are centers for the care and rehabilitation of the families of immigrants.

He stressed that today, due to many social and economic developments, the institution of the family suffers.

"Orphanage occurs when the child does not have care from his or her father and mother. If there will be no support of the institution of the family on the social and national level, then we will always have a problem with social orphans. Social orphans are not just in the families of immigrants but also in the families of successful businessmen who are not engaged in raising their children. No government program, even the best social service, can replace a child's father and mother," said the head of the church.

"If we do not foster the institution of the family, we always have the phenomenon of social orphans," he said.

The head of the UGCC also touched on the topic Ukrainian schools abroad, which need a lot of support. He gave the example of a Ukrainian school in Athens.

The roundtable was attended by Bishop Josyf (Milian), who presented the report on the work that the church does with children of immigrants.

Following the roundtable, a resolution was adopted for greater cooperation between the churches, religious organizations, and the government of Ukraine for the protection of the family and social care.
