# Metropolitan Soroka Announces New Mission in Front Royal, Va.

**Front Royal, Va.** – Metropolitan Stefan Soroka of the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Philadelphia announces a new mission community is being formed in Front Royal, the northern entrance to Shenandoah National Park and Skyline Drive.

Services at the new mission will begin with the celebration of the Divine Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom celebrated by Rev. Petro Zvarych at 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 12, in the chapel of Human Life International, 4 Family Life Lane, Front Royal, Virginia, 22630. The Divine Liturgy will then be celebrated every Saturday at 4:00 p.m. in English.

Organization of the mission was started after a request from local Ukrainian Catholics and other Eastern Catholics was sent to Archbishop Soroka. Preliminary work was undertaken to find a church or chapel to celebrate services on a regular basis. After some searching, a site was found at Human Life International in Front Royal.

The mission invites and welcomes anyone who would like to make this faith community their new spiritual home, and to experience the liturgical and spiritual traditions of Eastern Christianity.

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## Beheading of John the Baptist - August 29, 2015



#### Mk 6,14-29

King Herod heard about this, for Jesus' name had become well known. Some were saying, "John the Baptist has been raised from the dead, and that is why miraculous powers are at work in him." Others said, "He is Elijah." And still others claimed, "He is a prophet, like one of the prophets of long ago."

But when Herod heard this, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised from the dead!" For Herod himself had given orders to have John arrested, and he had him bound and put in prison. He did this because of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, whom he had married. For John had been saying to Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." So Herodias nursed a grudge against John and wanted to kill him. But she was not able to, because

Herod feared John and protected him, knowing him to be a righteous and holy man. When Herod heard John, he was greatly puzzled; yet he liked to listen to him.

Finally the opportune time came. On his birthday Herod gave a banquet for his high officials and military commanders and the leading men of Galilee. When the daughter of Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his dinner guests. The king said to the girl, "Ask me for anything you want, and I'll give it to you." And he promised her with an oath, "Whatever you ask I will give you, up to half my kingdom."

She went out and said to her mother, "What shall I ask for?" "The head of John the Baptist," she answered. At once the girl hurried in to the king with the request: "I want you to give me right now the head of John the Baptist on a platter."

The king was greatly distressed, but because of his oaths and his dinner guests, he did not want to refuse her. So he immediately sent an executioner with orders to bring John's head. The man went, beheaded John in the prison, and brought back his head on a platter. He presented it to the girl, and she gave it to her mother. On hearing of this, John's disciples came and took his body and laid it in a tomb.

August 29th marks the liturgical memorial of the martyrdom of St. John the Baptist, the forerunner of Jesus. In Roman calendar, the he is the only saint for whom we celebrate both his birth (June 24th) and his death by martyrdom. Today's memorial dates back to the dedication of a crypt of Sebaste, in Samaria, where by the mid- 4th century his head was already being venerated. The cult then spread to Jerusalem, to the Churches of the East, and to Rome under the title of the Beheading of St. John the Baptist. In the Roman martyrology, reference is made to a second-century discovery of this precious relic, which was transported for the occasion to the Church of St. Sylvester in Campo Marzio, Rome.

These little historical references help us to understand how ancient and deep the veneration of St. John the Baptist truly is. In the Gospels, his role in relation to Jesus is quite prominent. In particular, St. Luke recounts his birth,

his life in the desert and his preaching, and in today's Gospel St. Mark speaks to us about his dramatic death. John the Baptist begins his preaching under the emperor Tiberius, in 27-28 A.D., and the clear invitation he addresses to the people who come out to hear him is to prepare the way to welcome the Lord, to make straight the paths of their lives through a radical conversion of heart (cf. Luke 3:4).

But the Baptist does not limit himself to preaching repentance and conversion; rather, in recognizing Jesus as "the Lamb of God" who has come to take away the sins of the world (John 1:29), he has the deep humility to point to Jesus as the One truly sent by God, and he steps aside so that Christ might increase, be heard and followed.

As a last act, the Baptist bears witness with his blood to his fidelity to God's commandments, without giving up or turning back, thus fulfilling his mission to the end. St. Bede, a 9th century monk, in his Homilies says: St. John, for Christ, gave up his life, even though [his persecutor] had not demanded that he should deny Jesus Christ, but only that he should keep silent about the truth (cf. Hom. 23: CCL 122, 354). And he did not keep silent about the truth, and thus he died for Christ who is the Truth. For love of the truth, he did not give in to compromises with those who were powerful, nor was he afraid to address strong words to the one who lost his way to God.

Now we see this great figure -- this force -- in his passion, in his resistance against the powerful. We ask: where does this life come from, this interiority, which is so strong, so principled, so consistent, which is spent so totally for God and in preparing the way for Jesus? The answer is simple: from his relationship with God, from prayer, which is the guiding thread of his entire life. John is the divine aift long besought by his parents, Zechariah and Elizabeth (cf. Luke 1:13); a great gift, humanly unhoped-for since both of them were advanced in years and Elizabeth was barren (cf. Luke 1:7); but nothing is impossible for God (cf. Luke 1:36). The of announcement this birth occurred precisely in a place of prayer, in the temple of Jerusalem; indeed, it took place when, to Zechariah, there fell the great privilege of entering the temple's most sacred place, in order to offer incense to the Lord (cf. Luke 1:8-20). Even the Baptist's birth is marked by prayer: the hymn of joy, praise and thanksaiving that Zechariah raises to the Lord and that we recite each morning in Lauds -the "Benedictus" -- extols God's action in history and prophetically points to the mission of his son John: to go before the Son of God made flesh in order to prepare the way for him (Luke 1:67-79).

The entire life of Jesus' precursor was nourished by his relationship with God, especially during the time he spent in the wilderness (cf. Luke 1:80); the wilderness, a place of temptation, but also a place where man feels his own poverty, for there he is deprived of all support and material security, and he comes to understand that the only secure reference point is God Himself.

But John the Baptist is not only a man of prayer, of constant contact with God; he is also a guide in this relationship. The Evangelist Luke, in relating the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples -- the "Our Father" -- notes that the request made by the disciples was formulated with these words: "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples" (cf. Luke 11:1).

Dear brothers and sisters, celebrating the martyrdom of St. John the Baptist also reminds us -- Christians in our own times -- that we cannot aive into compromise when it comes to our love for Christ, for His Word, for His Truth. The Truth is the Truth; there is no compromise. The Christian life requires, as it were, the "martyrdom" of daily fidelity to the Gospel; the courage, that is, to allow Christ to increase in us and to direct our thoughts and actions. But this can only occur in our lives, if our relationship with God is strong. Prayer is not time lost, nor does it steal space away from our activities, even those that are apostolic; it is exactly the opposite: only if we are able to have a life of faithful, constant, trusting prayer, will God Himself give us the ability and strength to live in happiness and peace, to overcome difficulties, and courageously to bear witness to Him. May St. John the Baptist intercede for us, that we might always maintain the primacy of God in our lives. Thank you.

## **BRIEF HISTORY OF THE LEAGUE OF UKRAINIAN CATHOLICS**

The Legaue of Ukrainian Catholics of America was formed in August 1933 in Chicago, IL, through the efforts of members of the Ukrainian Catholic Church community and Father Ambrose Α. Senyshyn (who eventually rose to the rank of Archbishop Metropolitan all Ukrainian for Catholics in America). Fr. Senyshyn immigrated into the United States from Ukraine, at a time when this country was in the midst of a Great Depression. His first pastoral assignment was served in the parish of St. Nicholas, Chicago, IL. As part of this assignment he witnessed much poverty and human degradation. He was very sensitive to the needs of his parishioners and worked very hard to give them both Spiritual solace and assistance with their many problems. In response these needs, to he organized the Ukrainian Catholic Youth League (UCYL) organization now called the League of Ukrainian Catholics (LUC). It was intended to provide religious and social activities for the Ukrainian American Youth and also to provide an opportunity for the children of the new immigrants to be able to socialize with their

peers in and through the Church community.

#### Some early facts:

The UCYL/LUC published magazine, a the "Ukrainian Youth", written in both Ukrainian and English with a subscription rate of \$1.50 per year beginning in 1934.lt is written that this magazine has been "friend and teacher encouraging us, inspiring us, teaching to love our own, our church, and country". All this time it has been anchoring brother to brother, brother to sister, parents to children and children to parents. It has been enlightening us, the members of the Ukrainian second generation on this continent, about the faith and country of our fathers. It has been striving to show us the beauty of our faith, rite, and nationality and the reasons for the subjugation of Ukraine. It has been awakening in us a lover for all that is Ukrainian, and instilling in us the determination to defend our own, be it Church or country."

The LUC continues to publish a periodical under the title of "Action". This publication was issued regularly by the former editor Harry V. Makar and is currently published from the Niagara Frontier Council.

The UCYL/LUC was and is not just a social organization. As it arew. it focused its attention on the need to keep our Religious heritage as well as our Ukrainian identity alive. The membership in their local Councils/Chapters engaged themselves in their parishes, working closely with the Hierarchy and clergy to keep our Ukrainian Catholic Rite and identity vibrant and ever visible.

The following are some highlights of the various activities of the League of Ukrainian Catholics that evolved from the early structure of the Ukrainian Catholic Youth League.

#### **Conventions:**

The League has held Annual National Conventions from the founding of the League (earlier referred to as a Congress) up to the present time. Durina the war years, the membership ceased to gather, however resumed at the end of those times - 1948. This vear we celebrate the 77th Convention and the 80th Anniversary of the founding of the organization.

#### **Sports Rally:**

It is written in some of the early annals (1938) of the UCYL/LUC that there were "Track and Field" meets held during the conventions. The "track and field" events became known as the Sports Rally in later years. These rallies were organized separately from the Conventions. The Sports Rallies were held annually in the Spring where the membership competed in various sporting events. Events such as bowling, aolfing, tennis matches, trap shooting, vouth putting course, ping pong, billiards etc. were the regular activities, as well as other events for the younger children. The Sports Rallies brought together the young families of the parishes and through these events, the young children formed friendships that have lasted well into middle their vears. As the membership aged, the sports activities became less "strenuous". Eventually, the organization discontinued holding these events.

#### **Annual Retreats:**

In keeping with our Constitution's first

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that is "To purpose, promote the personal sanctification of each individual member. By example personal to draw others to a deeper love for God through the practice of our Catholic Faith in the Ukrainian Rite" the officers of the Board and National under the direction of the Spiritual Director, Rev. John P. Stevensky, a program of Annual Retreats was begun in July of 1977 and continues until today. In the early years two retreats were held - one in English and one in Ukrainian. Currently, the English retreat continues to enroll participants for the Lenten period.

#### **Burse Fund:**

Sometime in the late 1960's or early 1970's, National the Board of Directors began a program of support for "vocations". During the annual Convention, a monetary award was presented to a young seminarian to help in his studies. Later, in 1980, during the convention at Johnstown, PA, a "pledge drive" began and funds were collected that allowed the League to open several Burse Accounts that would then draw interest, that would be gifted to not only seminarians, but it was voted upon to help all - religious men, women and those in the seminary, from all Eparchies, to further their studies.

#### School Endowment Fund:

The second purpose of the League is Educational. In the late 1970s, the membership and the Board of Directors initiated the Sr. John Paskevich School Endowment Fund. The fund was established to arant to one of the Metropolia parochial schools a gift in the name of an exceptional student named by the school principal. This gift is given annually to a school in one of the Eparchies, on a rotating basis.

#### Vibrant Parish Activity:

On a grassroots level, the membership continues to work diligently in their local parishes and protopresbyteries (deaneries) to keep our Ukrainian Catholic Church and its distinct heritage alive, vibrant and thriving. Each Chapter and Council continues to support the activities of the Church, the League and each other. League members consistently organize or are otherwise actively involved in all of the activities, religious, spiritual and social, that comprise the life and spirit of the Church. They are active also in many acts of Christian charity at all levels.

The LUC is also an invaluable resource as a library and repository of materials and methods for religious education, parish activities on all levels, interaction, reflection, prayer, charitable activities and individual and communal support. In a word, the LUC actively pursues its stated Purposes:

• **Religious:** to promote the personal sanctification of each individual member

• **Educational:** to provide and to support programs that aid in the religious training of youth and adults at the parish level

• **Cultural:** to develop an appreciation (internally and externally) for the richness of our Eastern/ Byzantine Rite and our precious Ukrainian heritage • **Social:** to encourage friendship and collaboration between and among the members as well as between and among the parishioners in the communities where the LUC is active


• **Collaborative:** to foster and to promote unity and cooperation among all of the ecclesiastically approved organizations.





## **Oldest Ukrainian church building facing demolition**

The first church used by Ukrainian Byzantine Catholics in the United States will soon be no more, but its loss will help secure the future of its successor church.

The original St. Michael Ukrainian Catholic Church on West Centre Street in Shenandoah is scheduled for demolition, with work started now to prepare for the complete removal of the structure. It has not been used regularly as a worship site since 1908, with the exception of the early 1980s when Divine Liturgies were celebrated due to a massive fire that destroyed the second church building of the parish.

The 131-year-old structure, which had been modified over time, began to be used as a hall after the second church was built in 1908 in order to meet the needs of a growing congregation. The original church was also where the St. Michael's Social Club met and held activities.

The employees from Kass Contracting were at the site Thursday and Friday removing interior fixtures. No specific day has been set for when the wooden church will come down.

While the demolition will begin on the first St. Michael church, work is beginning on another project for repairs and upgrades at the parish's third church at Oak and Chestnut streets.

Heim Construction Company Inc., Pottsville, is the general contractor on the demolition and renovation projects at both sites.

Explaining the situation Friday in the rectory were Monsignor Myron Grabowsky, pastor, Paul Caputo, a member of the finance council, and Albert Breznik Jr., a member of the building council.

The work at the current church and the demolition of the first church are connected, Breznik said. With funding available to begin the renovations, Metropolitan Stefan Soroka, archbishop of the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchv of Philadelphia and spiritual head of all Ukrainian Catholics in the United States, was approached about the renovation project for permission to proceed.

"There was a parish meeting and the archbishop's directions to us were that in order to do this and to concentrate on preserving the church that we have now, we needed to lessen our liabilities," Breznik said. "What he meant by 'lessening our liabilities' was the property we have down on Centre Street and anything that is costing us money that we're not using. That (old church) was first and foremost."

Breznik provided some history of the parish and explained how the first church became a religious lifeboat after the parish's second church was destroyed in 1980.

"Let's go back to the beginning. That was the first Ukrainian Greek Catholic church in Breznik said. America." "In 1908, our forefathers in the church abandoned that building to move the parish to the building that burned down, which is right where we're sitting. After they began using the second church, the original church building was used as a social hall and for parties up until probably the early 1960s. The building was then vacant up until we needed it when our second church burned down for religious services."

The second church was destroyed in a fire in

1980 on Easter Monday morning. With the help of other Ukrainian Catholic churches, icons and other religious items were provided to the parish to add to the original church to celebrate the Divine Liturgy and other services. The first church was used until 1984, when the third and current church opened

in time for the parish's 100th anniversary.

Breznik said the first church reverted to a social hall, its purposes including the sale of the parish's homemade pierogies. The social club dissolved in 2009 due to a lack of members and funds, but the leftover funds were used to add the large mosaics on the outside of the current church.

"That was the last time that building was used," Breznik said.

As the demolition is beginning, scaffolding was erected around the church at Oak and Chestnut streets for outside work to begin in order to seal the domes, or cupolas, to keep water from entering the church. The work is being done by C&D Waterproofing Corp., Bloomsburg.

Grabowsky said the improvement work at the church is more than repairing and regilding the cupolas. The entire project is divided into two phases.

"There will be a whole new roof, new electrical, new air conditioning, a rest room upstairs for handicapped people," Grabowsky said. "In other words, bring the church up-to-date. We will also repair the bottom steps outside. Hopefully C&D will be here on Wednesday to start the roof and domes."

Caputo added, "There will be a special type of resin used to seal the domes. C&D has done work on the capitol buildings in Harrisburg and Richmond, Virginia. They have experience in this area."

"They specialize in the atypical roof," Breznik said. "Our problems with the domes is the seams in the domes. They'll encapsulate it, seal everything up, so we don't have the leaks. It was the domes leaking that sparked all this."

The leaking began in 1989 when Hurricane Hugo hit the area and Breznik said it has worsened over the years.

"While we have them (C&D) up there doing that, our roof is shot after 31 years," Breznik said. "And to bring things into the 21st century, we're going to change all of our lights to LED light fixtures."

"The windows in the dome will be bronze colored and insulated glass," Grabowsky said. "And there will a fan to circulate the air to ventilate the ceiling to keep the moisture from building up. And the church will have much better lighting."

The roof repairs, inside lighting work, the outside steps and repointing the grout around the windows and doors are part of Phase I. As funds become available, Phase II will begin for the plumbing, air conditioning, pews and carpeting.

"We're doing all the critical things to keep the water out and weatherization," Caputo said.

"This has been going on for 20 years, but we just never had the funds available," Breznick said. "Financially, we were unable to take on a project of this magnitude." "We've been blessed by a donor who contributed a large sum of funds to make this possible," Grabowsky said.

The cost of the demolition and the renovation/ repair work is still being determined, Grabowsky said, so no numbers are being released now. He said once a firm cost is set, the project costs will be released.

The Very Rev. Archpriest

John M. Fields, archeparchy director of communications, said there were very few choices for what needed to be done, especially in light of the needs and desire to make the repairs and improvements necessary at the church building used by the parishioners.

"The original church. which hasn't been used for all these years, has deteriorated to the point that it has become a liability not only to the parish, but to the archdiocese," Fields said. "The decision was made to put the resources into the current church to upgrade their church for the future. Also, in a town like Shenandoah that has a history of fires, the decision was made to bring the building down for safety and so it is not a hazard. There is no way for resources to be available to restore it or whatever you would do with it. It's not really necessary for the existing needs of the parish."

## ALL LOVE BEARS FRUIT

Not everyone is called to marriage. But every life is meant to be fertile. Every life has the power and the need to nurture new life — if not through bearing and raising children, then through other vital forms of self-giving, building, and service. The Church is an extended family of different vocations, each distinct but each needing and supporting the others. Priesthood, religious life, and the celibate lay vocation enrich, and are enriched by, the witness of the married state. The different ways of being chaste and celibate outside of marriage are ways of donating one's life to God's service and the human community.

In other words, not all men and women need to be biological parents to radiate God's love or take part in the "family of families" we know as the Church. The vocation to the priesthood, or vowed religious life, has its own integrity and glory. The Church always needs priests and religious, and parents must help all their sons and daughters listen for the possibility that God might be calling them to offer their lives in this way.

Everything the Church has taught about being created for joy, about being created in the image of God, about needing to love and be loved, applies equally to celibate and married persons. Celibacy can be confirmed and permanent, as in vowed religious life, or someone unable to marry due to disability or circumstance, or only potentially permanent, as in a young person discerning a vocation. In all of these cases, celibacy follows in the footsteps of Jesus, flourishing by offering the self to God and trusting his plan, and building a life premised on loving others with mercy, patience, generosity, and service.

#### We ought to ask ourselves:

What are some of the trials or burdens that unmarried people face in your community? How can friends, families, and parishes help? What are some of the benefits of celibacy? How can unmarried people serve the community?

Have you ever encouraged the children you know to become a priest or vowed religious? Why or why not?

What are some good reasons for choosing either marriage or celibacy? What are some not-so-good reasons? How should a person discern his or her vocation?

#### A PREPARATORY CATECHESIS FOR THE WORLD MEETING OF FAMILIES LOVE IS OUR MISSION – THE FAMILY FULLY ALIVE Part VI

#### LIGHT IN A DARK WORLD AND A HOME FOR THE WOUNDED HEART

At its best, the family is a school of love, justice, compassion, forgiveness, mutual respect, patience, and humility in the midst of a world darkened by selfishness and conflict. In these ways, the family teaches what it means to be human. However, many temptations arise which try to coax us into forgetting that male and female are created for covenant and communion. For example, poverty, affluence, pornography, contraception, philosophical and other intellectual mistakes can all create contexts that challenge or threaten healthy family life. The Church resists these things for the sake of protecting the family.

Many people, especially today, face painful situations resulting from poverty, disability, illness and addictions, unemployment, and the loneliness of advanced age. But divorce and same-sex attraction impact the life of the family in especially intimate ways. Christian families and networks of families should be sources of mercy, safety, friendship, and support for those struggling with these issues.

To grasp the Church's ministry of teaching correctly, we also need to consider her pastoral nature. Pope Francis once famously likened the Church to "a field hospital after battle." He said: "It is useless to ask a seriously injured person if he has high cholesterol and about the level of his blood sugars! You have to heal his wounds. Then we can talk about everything else. Heal the wounds, heal the wounds....!and you have to start from the ground up." Sexuality is uniquely vulnerable to such wounds. Men, women, and children can be wounded by promiscuous sexual behavior (their own and that of others), pornography and other forms of objectification, rape, prostitution, human trafficking, divorce, and the fear of commitment created by an increasingly anti-marriage culture.

The New Evangelization can be understood as bringing the wounded in from the battlefield of the world to encounter the Divine Physician and the healing that he offers within the community of the Church. Pope Francis sees this task as the challenge of being a "missionary Church," or "a Church which goes forth." Taking part in sacramental life, developing a life of prayer, the practice of charity, spiritual disciplines, accountability and support from church friends — these things offer the wounded but recovering Christian a path of conversion. We ought to ask ourselves:

a)The Church is a field hospital. How does the Church help people who are wounded? How can we do better?

b)What are the obstacles to creating close spiritual friendships in your culture? What can your parish or eparchy do to encourage Catholic friendships?

c)What support exists in your parish or eparchy for making progress in chastity? Are there support groups or opportunities for education? How often is the Sacrament of Penance offered, and are there opportunities for spiritual direction?

And certainly we did not know what the place to meet the living Christ will be not a parish community, but Kyiv Maidan and the frontline."

Therefore, according to him, this Patriarchal Cathedral will be a "moment to hear the word of God."

## **Pope Francis: Audience reflection on celebration, work and prayer**

August 12, 2015

Pope Francis held his weekly General Audience on Wednesday morning in the Paul VI Hall. The Holy Father dedicated his catechetical reflection once again to the family, opening a new phase in the series of reflections on the family, to three specific facets of family.

"It is God himself who teaches us the importance of dedicating time to contemplating and enjoying the fruits of our labours, not only in our employment or profession, but through every action by which we as men and women cooperate in God's creative work, even in times of difficulty," said Pope Francis. The Pope went on to note that, even in the workplace, we celebrate – a birthday, a marriage, a new baby, a farewell or a welcome, and that true moments of celebration make us pause from our work, because they remind us that we are made in the image and likeness of God, who is not a slave to work, but the Lord of work. "So," he said, "we must never be slaves to work but rather its master." Nevertheless, "We know that millions of men and women, even children, are slaves to work. The obsession with economic profit and technical efficiency puts the human rhythms of life at risk," he continued.

Pope Francis concluded his reflection with a focus on the need to recover attunement to the rhythms of life, which are found most especially in the sense of the sacred that at once draws to and flows from Sunday, the day of rest, and its centerpiece, the Eucharistic celebration. "Moments of rest, especially on Sunday, are sacred because in them we find God," said Pope Francis, adding that the Sunday Eucharist brings to our celebrations every grace of Jesus Christ: his presence, his love and his sacrifice; his forming us into a community, and his way of being with us. "Everything is transfigured by his grace: work, family, the joys and trials of each day, even our sufferings and death," he continued.

Pope Francis concluded with a prayer: "May we always recognize the family as the privileged place to understand, guide and sustain the gifts which arise from our celebrations, especially the Sunday Eucharist." (Vatican Radio)

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## At the General Audience Pope Francis calls for acceptance and care for wounded families - No closed doors

August 5, 2015

"No closed doors!", Pope Francis repeated to the to the faithful who gathered for the General Audience on Wednesday, 5 August, in St Peter's Square. He called on Christians to ensure the acceptance and pastoral care of those who have begun a new union after a failed sacramental marriage.

Having finished the July's summer break, the Pontiff again began weekly meetings with the faithful in the Paul VI Hall Continuing the cycle of catecheses on the family, he focused on the situation of "the baptized who have established a new relationship of cohabitation after the failure of the marital sacrament.

The Church, he said, "is fully aware that such a situation contradicts the Christian Sacrament". It is important to recognize, however, there is a "difference between one subjected to separation compared to one who has caused it". In any case, "these persons are by no means excommunicated" and, the Pope emphasized, "they should absolutely not be treated as such: they are always part of the Church".

In particular the Pope recommended taking into account the repercussions that such situations have on young children. Care must be taken "so as not to add even more to the burdens which the children in these situations already feel they have to bear!". From here came his appeal that all Christians to commit to taking "care of wounded families, accompanying them in the life of faith of the community". Each one is called to "do his part in taking on the attitude of the Good Shepherd, who knows each one of his sheep and excludes no one from his infinitive love!".

Metropolitan is the one, who by God's will, was entrusted to go the powerful of this world and say: "Let my people go". It was said by the Head and Father of the UGCC, His Beatitude Sviatoslav in the air of the First national channel in the frame of project "Sheptytsky: unclassified history" on 29th of July.

According to the Head of the UGCC, metropolitan Andrey in all difficult situations tried to proclaim God's moral law, even while he forwarded chaplains into different military units: "He did it for priests to be the preachers of God's moral law among their people".

In His Beatitude's opinion, bishop Andrey's message "Do not murder" to the Nazi leadership is very interesting.

In the context of WW II this letter is aimed at Ukrainian politicians, as well. There is exactly said, political motives do not release from this God's commandment. "Political murder is the same crime as all other types of murders. Metropolitan also applied with this word to his people, for he as a shepherd, was extremely concerned about Ukrainians were drawn in a deadly sinful whirl of murdering", - explained an orator. As it is known, catholic's theology teaches that sin of murder is punished with a small excommunication, meaning a separation from the Church.

Therefore, metropolitan Andrey, proceeded the Head of the UGCC, during the WW II gathered Lviv Archeparchial cathedrals where together with clergy he was thinking how to prevent Greek-Catholics from a seduction of murdering and how to heal those who had been trapped into that sin. "Mainly here is seen how logically it was about chaplains to be present in UPA, "Galicia" division or another pastoral presence of Ukrainian priesthood among people", - added he.

The main archbishop pointed out, according to the Jews, metropolitan Andrey was the only catholic hierarch in Europe who protested openly against killing the Jews. Consequently, the parliament of Canada acknowledged solemnly his heroic virtues, in particular because of saving Jews during the Holocaust. "What is interesting, when this decision was voted with one accord, the whole Canadian parliament greeted with applauds the delegation of UCC and RO", - reminded the archbishop.

Thinking about a figure of a Great metropolitan, His Beatitude Sviatoslav said that history of princely Ukrainian families was very hard. Princely families who had been influenced by Moscow reign were russificated, another were trapped into a Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth's cultural and religious sphere of influence, were separated from their people and got polonised.

In that case people had been remaining for many centuries. "Metropolitan Andrey as a European aristocrat, descended from an ancient Ukrainian family, in a particular moment heard a voice, calling him back to his people. Even more, he had been collecting treasures of Ukrainian people's culture. Everything what affirmed materially high culture of Ukrainians, when scientists were objecting or were not brave enough to speak about Ukrainian people's existence, he gave it to Ukraine, - told the Head and Father of UGCC. – This act of granting a precious treasure to Ukrainian people is a fact of a nation's formation. By this he acknowledged people with a right for their existence and he returned them their culture and their dignity".

"To be a follower of metropolitan Andrey is a divine grace and challenge, simultaneously", - shared his mind His Beatitude Sviatoslav. – For metropolitan was a man of world's concern. Ukrainian people and UGCC once had experienced this kind of globalization, occurring now again. It was at the end of XIX – beginning XX centuries. The reasons were different. Firstly, high waves of Ukrainian emigration. Preciously that time he felt himself being a Head of a global Church. To his ecumenical idea he gave all his life".

Here the Head of the UGCC reminded an occasion when bishop Andrey, after February revolution headed to Sankt-Peterburg where he had a meeting with Russian intelligentsia. Then, Russian government considered, in fact, UGCC to be the part of Russia. It is known in what way he was speaking on behalf of Ukrainian people during the so called meeting of a Nation's league which divided a map of Europe after

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the World War first. "Distinctively, there was no other left who could speak on behalf of people who were left of their own country during those events of a world level. So, as we can see metropolitan Andrey was a giant not only in intellectual way. It is a person who embraced the main principles according to what is possible to consolidate Ukrainian people", - mentioned His Beatitude Sviatoslav.

Finishing up, the Head of the Church proposed to remember a famous work of bishop Andrey "How to build a native home". "This work is written when the Ukrainian house was burning during the WW II. In this work an author stressed on the importance of an inner unity. Ukrainian people must reveal to themselves not only the figure of metropolitan but also the way to freedom that was shown us", - finished he.
